### Thank you for attending the 3rd Annual Black History Month Community Wellness Fair!

When we established the Black History Community Wellness Fair we never imagined we would be around three years later. We are thrilled that we've kept up our commitment to educate the black, indigenous, and people of color (BIPOC) community about the healthcare system and health conditions, especially as it relates to COVID, invaluable services and the individuals who work in the system.

This year, we opened the fair with a powerful panel on the Social Determinants of Health. Professionals discussed issues regarding housing, employment, healthcare, oral health, and education. We closed the event with an actual healthcare fair, which we hadn't done before. At the fair we offered vaccine shots, fluoride varnish rinses, and HEP and HIV test kits.

As the state of public health continued to evolve in Maine, the focal point of the fair shifted as well to meet the need. In 2021, given the state of the pandemic at the time, we prioritized COVID-related information and education, the schools and states' response, the vaccine, how we take care of ourselves, and how our youth were coping with all of the associated changes and challenges. This year, it was important for us to bring you all something different. We aimed to address COVID and the current state of the pandemic, but we also wanted to prioritize general healthcare and the impact of our health systems on members of the Black community. As we hope that the Wellness Fair will serve as a conversation starter for discussions that continue to take place beyond Black History Month, we put together this toolkit full of resources to support our community in this process. The disparities in healthcare, especially for people of color, are devastating. It is going to take a collective effort to diminish these threats in order to achieve more fair and just healthcare systems, and a more equitable society. On behalf of the entire Black History Month Community Wellness Fair Planning Committee, we want to sincerely thank all of our guest speakers and attendees for participating in this year's event. We hope you will find this toolkit helpful and useful. We also hope that you will join us again in 2024 as we continue working to decrease the inequities in healthcare and beyond.






